

When Rotary and its partners launched the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in 1988, there were 350,000 cases of polio in 125 countries every year. We've made great progress against the disease since then. Today, polio cases have been reduced by 99.9 percent, and just two countries continue to report cases of wild poliovirus: Afghanistan & Pakistan.

With polio nearly eradicated, Rotary and its partners must sustain this progress and continue to reach every child with the polio vaccine. This month, we encourage you to make an effort in your Club to help make history!

Basic Education & Literacy

RC ANTIGUA SUNDOWN

The Rotary and Rotaract Clubs of Georgetown Central in collaboration with corporate partners executed a 2-phase project to educate and empower girls of the Hauraruni Children's Home, Soesdyke Linden Highway. Twenty-two girls under 18 years benefited from guidance and empowerment sessions to widen their perspectives and opportunities. Their learning environment was improved by adding furniture, book racks, dry erase boards, other learning materials and personal care supplies. Meanwhile, their kitchen garden was shaded and replanted, and surroundings were enhanced with brightly painted tyres and plants.







Beach Cleanup | Soup Kitchen Supporting the Environment

RC Antigua Sundown conducted a Beach cleanup of Pensioner's Beach on Aug 14, 2021 Rotarians from their sister club (Rotary Club of Antigua) were invited. In addition, the Club engaged in a community service project to feed the less fortunate at a local Soup kitchen. The Club also helped to build capacity at the soup kitchen by donating 2 water tanks to increase their water storage capacity.





RC PARAMARIBO RESIDENCE







In 2018, RC Paramaribo Residence started a project in collaboration with the RKBO (Roman Catholic Special Education) to enhance the didactic skills of math teachers in primary education. Up to May 2020, forty teachers have been trained by RCPR fellow Ewald Levens. Unfortunately, the Covid19 pandemic has interrupted the training and demanded a change of course. The new approach is to make instruction videos (total of 25) in different local languages and distribute them to schools mainly in the rural areas and the interior of Suriname. The launch of this project took place on September 9th.

RC SOUTHWEST TOBAGO

Back to School Basic Education & Literacy







RC Southwest Tobago held its Back to School project with the aim of aiding low income earning families who have been adversely affected by the COVID19 pandemic. Rotarians came together to shop for supplies and grocery items, package preparation and distribution to parents. This ensured that students were provided with the necessary supplies to begin the school term. RC Southwest Tobago through financial contributions of its members and other donors was able to prepare forty-eight (48) packages with school supplies and grocery items for students on their return to school.

RC Paramaribo Central, in collaboration with Rotary Club Northwest Ohio, donated a MESA container with medical goods to the AZP, RKZ's Lands hospital, the diakonessen hospital and retirement home Ashiana. Rotary Club of Northwest Ohio of the USA founded MESA (Medical Equipment and Supplies Abroad Foundation, Inc.) of district 6600, in 1981 to support worldwide with medical supplies. The total value of the items donated by Mesa was over USD 200,000. Earlier in the year, a batch of wigs was also received for cancer patients of the Diakonessen Hospital. And in 2018, a MESA container with medical goods for various hospitals and institutions was also received through the intermediary of Rotary Ohio. These goods were then symbolically handed over by Past Rotary International President, Ian Risely, who was present in Suriname at the time.

Understanding that awareness and maintenance of visual health has an integral impact on literacy and learning, the RC Tobago continued its "For Sight Project" for a 3rd consecutive year in the form of an informative virtual session titled: "Shedding Light On Blue Light". In addition, the 2021 Back to School Project was a collaborative effort between the Golden Lane Police Youth Club and the Rotary Clubs of North York and G.O.A.L.S in District 7070. They were supported by the Rotary Clubs of Maraval, St. Augustine and Tobago and Rotaract Club of Tobago in District 7030. A total of 50 backpacks were distributed to primary and secondary school students of Golden Lane and environs.

Also, this year the WASH project (water, sanitation and hygiene) focused on COVID-related hygiene education and bathroom beautification. The project consisted of two phases, the first being beautification of bathroom stalls with motivational words and words of affirmation to uplift and inspire the students attending the schools. The second phase consisted of short animated videos and posters that addresses COVID-related hygiene.
